Scripture Memory Tip

When learning to ride a bike, you practice with training wheels first. Similarly, practicing a verse with the first letter of each word helps bridge the gap between complete dependence

on the printed text and a fluent recitation. Try "reading" Psalm 23:1 from these letters: T L i m s; I s n w. For children, this looks like a fun secret code. But for all of us, it's a helpful next step after reading the verse aloud a few times.

Ready to give it a try? The back of each SwordGrip verse card (above) includes the first letter of each word. You can also use our free VerseLocker app (pg. 3) to memorize any verse using the initials feature.


Memorizer Testimony

Choosing a Translation for Memory Work

From which translation should you memorize? For years, Scripture memorizers have wrestled with this important question. If you feel overwhelmed by the infinite number of choices, we recommend making your decision with these guidelines in mind:

1. Choose a more literal, word-for-word translation. God's Word came through verbal inspiration. Jesus said, "The *words* that I speak to you are spirit, and they are life" (John 6:63). Paul writes, "These things we also speak, not in *words* which man's wisdom teaches but which the Holy Spirit teaches..." (1 Cor. 2:13). And again, Jesus says, "Heaven and earth will pass away, but My *words* will by no means pass away" (Matt. 24:35). Though no two languages match up in 100% word-for-word correspondence, some translations are more literal than others. Choosing a more literal translation honors the doctrine of verbal inspiration and leaves interpretation to the Holy Spirit—where it belongs.

2. Stick to one translation. Once you've chosen a more literal, word-for-word translation, *stick with it*! In this day of 1,000 English versions available in 100,000 different editions, one might easily become a jack-of-all-translations and master-of-none. Certainly, other translations can help us in study and commentary, but we don't want our quoting of God's Word to come from the ESNIVNASBCSVNLT version! When Satan comes and asks, "Has God indeed said...?" (Gen. 3:1), we must vigorously prepare to say, like our Lord Jesus said, "It is written..." (Matt. 4:4) and then quote precisely. Jesus' corrections of the Sadducees and Pharisees often relied on a single word or even verb tense (Matt. 22:43; Mark 12:24; John 10:35). Indeed, not one jot or tittle will by any means pass from the law till all is fulfilled (Matt. 5:17-18).

3. Remember the main point of memorizing Scripture. Believing in Jesus Christ to save us from sin and obeying His Word matter far more than translation choice (John 20:31; 2 Tim. 3:15). To be a hearer of the word but not a doer is to build one's house on sand. Such people deceive themselves (Matt. 7:26-27; James 1:22). Let us avoid Jesus' indictment in John 5:39-40, "You search the Scriptures, for in them you think you have eternal life; and these are they which testify of Me. But you are not willing to come to Me that you may have life." Treasuring God's precious words brings sweetness, treasure, and light (Psa. 19:10; 119:130)!

The Unopened Toolbox

In nearly every area of life, doing something well requires a certain amount of homework. Successfully installing a new light fixture, assembling a bookshelf, or changing the oil in your car is unlikely to go smoothly if you don't at least read the instructions. Depending on the size and significance of the job, you might even get advice from a friend



or watch a tutorial video. Your goal, of course, is not to prepare endlessly—only as long as it takes to become adequately familiar with the proper tools and methods. When at last you feel qualified for the task at hand, you have every intention of putting what you've learned into practice.

Beginning to memorize Scripture is like installing a spiritual appliance—**one with immense power to completely transform your life** (Psa. 19:7). Successful installation will take some work, and you won't regret investing some time on the front end learning how to memorize Scripture effectively. How will you select verses to memorize? What system or app works best for you? What sort of review system will you follow? These are all good questions, and you'll benefit from having your toolbox filled with the best methods and resources. But the truth is, a toolbox that never gets opened isn't really worth having.

Whether you're a new memorizer or a seasoned pro, **don't fall into the trap of perpetual preparation.** Organizing your list of memory verses is good. Carefully considering what to memorize next is good. So is laminating your verse cards and reading articles about how to memorize more effectively. But preparing to memorize Scripture isn't the same as actually memorizing Scripture. Truly, a head full of the best strategies and methods isn't nearly as valuable as a heart full of Scripture.
